that's where we should put his neck.

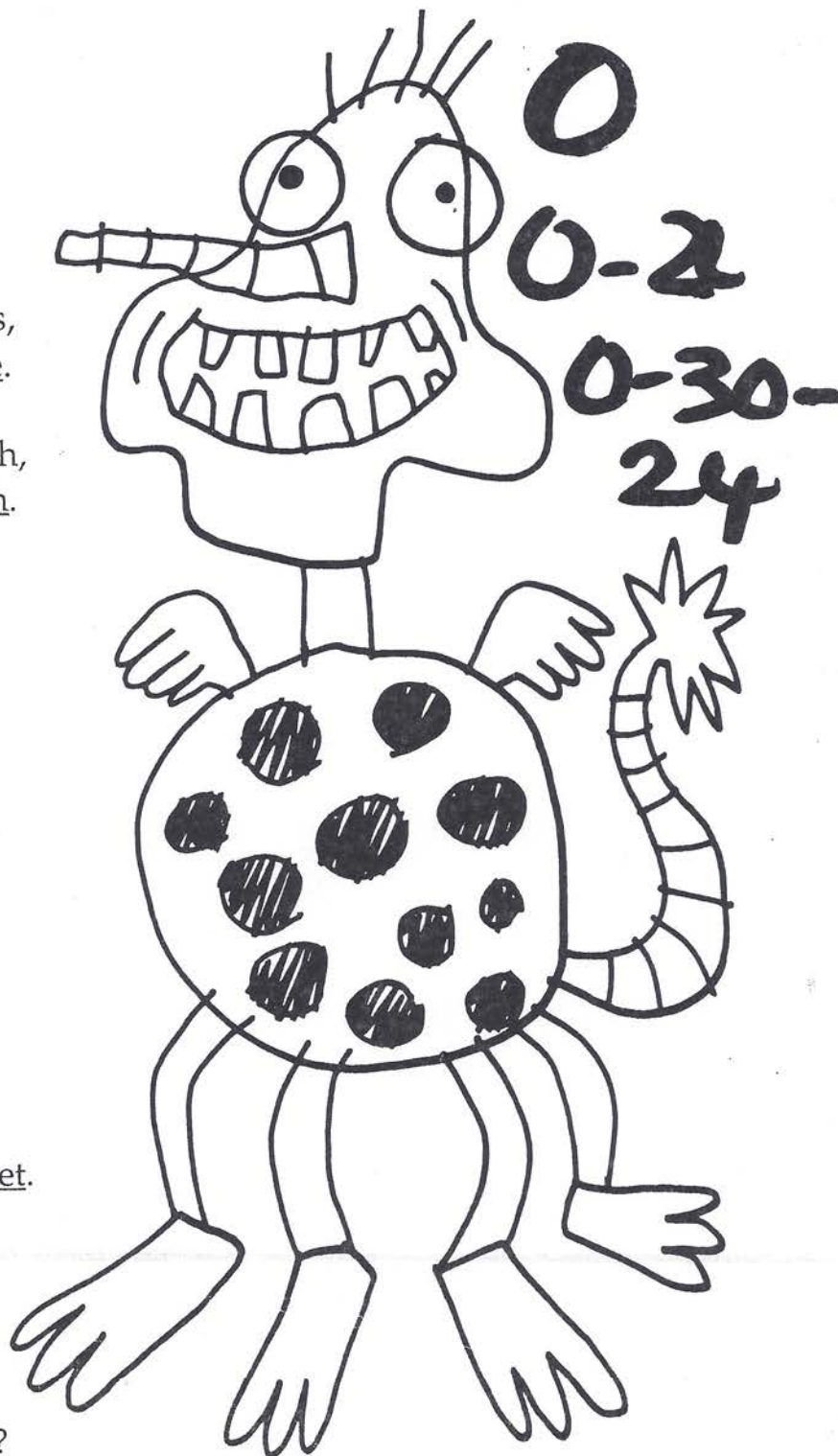
So he won't be tipsy-toddy,
